IN MEMORY OF GWEN KOTH

Cayman BRAC – Divi Tiara Resort

Eleven ADA members boarded Cayman Airways Jul 19 for a full 3 days of diving. The first day's morning storm did not slow us down as we headed out by boat to dive the Russian Destroyer called M.V. Keith Tibbetts – which can also be a beach dive. Tibbetts offered 300 feet of wreck to explore in and out. The second morning dive was changed into a drift dive due to currents – we were not disappointed, rather we became fortunate - drifting East Chute Wall was spectacular! Speeding along deep canyons along a brilliant wall with deep blue endless depths below. A third Friday dive on the tugboat wreck called Kissamee concluded the afternoon. Later that night the tougher divers – Lon, Enrique, and Jim did the Kissamee again but by beach.

Saturday, excitement brewed as we embarked on a 45-minute cruise to Little Cayman to do the wall spots called The Bloody Wall and then The Mixing Bowl. These spots offer everything in the way of life plus the spectacular wall scenery. Seeing the drop to the abyss is spectacular – make sure the camera lanyards are connected – the walls don't bottom out! We cruised back, had lunch and went for the afternoon dive – dodging visibility issues we settled upon the Patches.

Sunday, we could not help ourselves – we had to go back to Little Cayman. We could not be bored if we did these wall dives 100 times in a row. We all showed regret as we got back up after the second dive – it was our last.

We spent Sunday afternoon reflecting on our dives, seeing the slide show from the digital camera divers, crafting an ADA – “we were here sign” to help decorate the Divi Tiria Resort grounds – a tradition. The resort was great, the boat was great, the diving was spectacular. Monday morning, Jim was too grumpy at having to wake up at 4:30 AM as we started the trip back to Miami – I suspect he was just going to miss BRAC diving too much.

Indian Key State Historic Site.

(Possible snorkeling at the San Pedro underwater archaeological preserve - depending on seas and weather).

Rent or BYK and join us for a short paddle to Indian Key. Snorkel and explore the shallow reefs around the key. Indian Key history dates from the time of prehistoric Indians to the 1830's, when the key was the seat of the newly created Dade County. Jacob Housman bought the strategic key in 1831 and turned it into a busy port of wrecking. In 1838 Dr. Henry Perrine moved to India Key to pursue his interest in tropical botany where he was killed in an Indian attack in the early morning of August 7, 1840. Indian Key has remained uninhabited and Dr. Perrine's plants have grown over the ruins. For more information call Julio 305-551-7545.

ADVICE TO OLDER DIVERS

Through Project Dive Exploration DAN is trying to answer questions about aging and diving. Using Doppler to detect venous gas emboli over the heart of divers, they found that 30% more bubbles was found in divers at age 57 than those at age 33, and 20 % more in males than females. They concluded that "If we are cardiovascularly fit, exercise regularly, not more than 20% overweight, and have no serious potentially incapacitating disease, we shouldn't stop diving. BUT as we age beyond 60 we might consider limiting our diving to shallower depths...." For complete info on this subject see "Alert Diver" July 2001.

ADA RULES & REGULATIONS

All Members Must be familiar with the following

FOR ALL ADVANCED DIVES (DEPTHS OVER 60') ADA DIVERS MUST:

1. Be current (dive activity within the previous 3 months).
2. Have the approval of an ADA Safety Officer.
3. Have a minimum of 25 logged dives.
4. Carry an alternate air source (octopus), time keeping device and depth gauge.
5. Have previous ADA diving experience.
6. All members must dive with at least a 72 cubic foot tank.

ADA GUIDELINES FOR COMPUTER ASSISTED DIVING

1. Members using dive computers may extend their time underwater ten-(10) minutes beyond the time allowed by the tables.
2. Computer assisted dives must be well within the NO DECOMPRESSION LIMITS.
3. Members should understand and follow the manufacturer's recommendations.
4. If a computer diver is buddied with a diver using the tables, both must follow the tables.
5. If a buddy-team is using unlike computers, both must follow the more conservative computer.
6. If, in a buddy-team, either computer fails, both divers must terminate the dive.

IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM THE SAFETY OFFICERS' COMMITTEE

All members are reminded to read the "Rules & Guidelines for Diving Activities" you received with your membership package. Number 16 states, "All divers must be present for the pre-dive briefing". If the diver is not present for the entire briefing, diving privileges may be revoked for that dive. Please plan to arrive on time - or better yet - a bit early. We thank you and appreciate your cooperation.

Rodales Tip of the Day

Swim Efficiently Under Water

Swim at a slow and steady pace. Stops and starts decrease efficiency. Also, if possible, swim completely submerged--our tests of scuba fins clearly indicate that fin performance is best when a diver is completely submerged.

CANCELLATION AND REFUND POLICY FOR LOCAL DIVE TRIPS

Because of our contractual agreements with our service agents - dive shops and boat captains, we must notify them - usually seven days in advance - of the final number of spaces we are paying for. Thus, if our members cancel less than seven days in advance, we regret that *NO REFUND OR CREDIT* can be given, unless trip cancellation insurance has been purchased at the time of the dive trip payment (see next news article!)

ADA TRIP CANCELLATION INSURANCE

The Board of Directors has approved a unique concept in local diving: *NO FAULT INSURANCE!!*

For an additional \$5.00, per person, per local dive trip, members can eliminate the worry of losing their dive fees because of an unforeseen change of plans.

If, for any reason you are unable to attend a local dive for which you are scheduled and have paid the insurance, ADA will credit your \$29.00 dive fee to another date. *The \$5.00 insurance is non-transferable and non-refundable!*

When you make a reservation, ask for dive trip cancellation insurance.

The Board has elected to continue the insurance offer for 2001.

NOTE: It may be discontinued at any time without prior written notice.

Please call Lon with your questions and comments.

IMPORTANT WEATHER INFORMATION

Before departing for the dive site, confirm weather condition with Lon or the designated Safety Officer. It is the responsibility of the member to call; we cannot call you due to the large number of divers involved. For morning dives, call between 6 and 10 p.m. the night before the dive. For afternoon dives, call between 9 and 10 a.m. the morning of the dive.


ARE YOU COVERED???

Most divers here in the states have medical insurance through a US based company. We assume that it will cover our medical expenses if we have an accident or illness. But check your policy- most do not cover us when ill or injured in a foreign country. This fact was brought to light by the recent illness of one of our members while in Cayman Brac. (see article this issue) The GOOD news is that this diver had the wisdom to have DAN insurance, which covers expenses in any country worldwide and is specially tailored for divers. Do you need DAN insurance? YES!!! if you travel or plan to travel abroad. DAN is a non profit corporation which offers inexpensive coverage your policy may not. Applications can be obtained on line or at most ADA activities. Ask the ADA Safety Officer at the next dive you attend.

HOW TO MAKE DIVE RESERVATIONS

- 1) ✓ Check this newsletter or the annual calendar for upcoming dives.
- 2) ☎ Call Lon at (305) 251-4975 to make a reservation. Please do not leave requests on his answering machine, the trip may be full.
- 3) We will hold your reservation for four (4) days from the date you call. If we do not receive payment within four days, your space may be given to other members. If you wish to confirm receipt, call Lon.
- 4) Ask for details about the trip when you call. Otherwise, details will be given when you call for a weather check. (See "Important Weather Information" this and every issue)
- 5) ☒ Make your check payable to ACTIVE DIVERS ASSOCIATION, not to any individual, and mail to:

- 6) Itemize dates of dives on bottom-left corner of check.
- 7) Do not pay for persons other than spouses or other family members. Include their names on check.

REMEMBER: That family members must have completed individual documentation to register as ADA members.
