Sites may include: Conch Reef, Davis Ledge, Hens & Chickens, Little Conch, Capt. Tom's Ledge, 40' Ledge, Fish Trap, Horseshoe. Average dept h 30', average visibility 40-60', many morays, schooling tropicals, unusual pillar corals.

Sat. 5-17 AM Biscayne Park (inc tanks)


Sites may include: Rocky Reef, Elkhorn Forest, Ball Buoy, Far Out Reef, Cuda Ledge. Usually no currents, massive corals, small caves. The Keys "Best Kept Secret", only one commercial boat allowed in area. Depth 20-30', vis 30-60'.

Sat. 5-24 PM Tenneco Towers (Advanced)

Choice of more t han 40 wrecks. Some unlike anywhere else: J et airliner, M-60 Tanks, Tankers, Freight ers, Tugs, Barges. Most are intact with penet ration possible. Average depth 90', visibility 40-50'. Expect currents and dramatic profiles, many f ish. See advanced criterion this issue.

In the 25 years that I have been diving, My favorite Florida dive trip has been on Looe Key, off Big Pine Key in the lower Keys. While most of our members surely know about Looe Key, maybe there are newly-certified folks or recent transplants to Florida who don't. I will mention a few words about the reef.

Looe Key is not a Key at all, but a "groove and spur" coral reef with living heads rising so tall from the sandy bottom (depths in the 20's to low 30' range) that they almost break the surface at low tide. The reef was named after the British sailing frigate, HMS Looe, which broke up on the coral heads in 1744. Part of the wreckage ca still be seen in the water of remarkable clarity. The tall coral heads are separated like the fingers on a hand, with clean sandy bottom between, permitting comfortable viewing of the whole height of each finger of living rock.

The marine life always has been abundant and colorful on Looe Key, with everything from tiny tropicals and bright yellowtails to parrotfish, barracuda (with bodies like telephone poles), large lobster darting under rocks, and delicate multicolored corals. (I'll save my personal 'cuda story for next time.) There used to be great spear fishing and lobstering there until Looe Key was made a marine sanctuary in 1981.

One attraction of the reef is the smaller crowds of divers than in Pennykamp or even Key West, due to the relative remoteness of Big Pine from the population centers of the Keys. While there are a few shops running trips to Looe Key now, often the dive boat that your trip uses will be the only one on the reef, and you will have this paradise largely to yourself.

I started diving Looe Key in 1978, when I lived 1,000 miles away in Kentucky. My friend, Paul Glass, ran the only dive shop in Lexington, and ran several trips a year to multiple stops in Florida, from the fresh water sinks and springs of North Florida to the lower Keys. I got to tag along with Paul to help check out the new class of divers getting their Open Water Certifications and enjoying the best diving in the state.

I liked Florida so much, I moved here in 1981. Since then, I have enjoyed diving in exotic locations including the lava tubes of Hawaii, the Yucatan Peninsula in Mexico, the Virgin Islands, and more, But some of the best diving in the world is practically in our backyard: the Keys. And the best diving, in my opinion, is in Looe Key. The Big Pine Chamber of Commerce still puts on the "Underwater Music Festival" each July.

The General Info:



ADA RULES & REGULATIONS

All Members Must be familiar with the following

FOR ALL ADVANCED DIVES

(DEPTHS OVER 60') ADA DIVERS MUST:

- Be current (dive activity within the previous 3 months). Have the approval of an ADA Safety Officer.
- 2. 3.
- Have a minimum of 25 logged dives. Carry an alternate air source (octopus), time keeping device and depth
- gauge Have previous ADA diving experience. 5.
- 6. All members must dive with at least a 72 cubic foot tank.

ADA GUIDELINES FOR **COMPUTER ASSISTED DIVING**

1.

- Members using dive computers may extend their time underwater ten-(10) minutes beyond the time allowed by the tables. Computer assisted dives must be well within the NO DECOMPRESSION 2.
- LIMITS. 3. Members should understand and follow the manufacturer's recommenda-
- tions. If a computer diver is buddyed with a diver using the tables, both must 4.
- follow the tables. If a buddy-team is using unlike computers, both must follow the more con-servative computer. 5.
- 6. If, in a buddy-team, either computer fails, both divers must terminate the dive

All members are reminded to read the "Rules & Guidelines for Diving Activities" you received with your membership package. Number 16 states, "All divers must be present for the pre-dive briefing". If the diver is not present for the en-tire briefing, diving privileges may be revoked for that dive. Please plan to arrive on time - or better yet - a bit early. CANCELLATION AND REFUND POLICY FOR LOCAL DIVE TRIPS

Because of our contractual agreements with our service agents dive shops and boat captains, we must notify them - usually seven days in advance - of the final number of spaces we are paving for. Thus, if our members cancel less than seven days in advance, we regret that *NO REFUND OR CREDIT* can be given, unless trip cancellation insurance has been purchased at the time of the dive trip payment (see next news article!)

ADA TRIP CANCELLATION INSURANCE

The Board of Directors has approved a unique concept in local diving: NO FAULT INSURANCE!!

For an additional \$5.00, per person, per local dive trip, members can eliminate the worry of losing their dive fees because of an unforeseen change of plans.

If, for any reason you are unable to attend a local dive for which you are scheduled and have paid the insurance, ADA will credit your dive fee to another date. The \$5.00 insurance is nontransferable and non-refundable!

When you make a reservation, ask for dive trip cancellation insurance. The Board has elected to continue the insurance offer for this year.


NOTE: It may be discontinued at any time without prior written notice.

IMPORTANT WEATHER INFORMATION

Before departing for the dive site, confirm weather condition with Lon or the designated Safety Officer. It is the responsibility of the member to call: we cannot call you due to the large num ber of divers involved. For morning dives, call between 6 and 10 p.m. the night before the dive. For afternoon dives, call be tween 9 and 10 a.m. the morning of the dive.





SPIEGAL GROVE AS A TRAINING SITE

The 510 foot ship is being used as a training site for police and fire department divers learning to rescue people trapped in overturned ships and ferries. Key Largo Volunteer Fire Department instructor Max Walchuk helped recover bodies from the Senegalese ferry that sank in Sept., killing more than 1800. Most of the dead were inside the wreck, 75 feet deep. Walchuk received a medal of valor from the Senegalese government for his efforts. He invited Senegal's defense attaché' to view the wreck from Capt. Slates glass bottom boat. Slate demonstrated the use of specialized dive gear for underwater rescues. Walchuk has volunteered to train Senegalese divers how to respond to possible future disasters.
