October Dive Schedule

Oct 3 Sun pm Islamorada

Just 4 miles past Tavernier, sites may include: Hammerhead, The Canyon, El Infante, Crocker, No Name, The Valley Aquarium, Alligator. Average depth 30–40', visibility 40–50'. Some current, many fish, shallow wrecks.

Oct 9 Sat am Biscayne National Park

Sites may include: Rocky Reef, Elkhorn Forest, Ball Buoy, Far Out Reef, Cuda Ledge. Usually no currents, massive corals, small caves. The Keys "Best Kept Secret", only one commercial boat allowed in area. Depth 20–30', vis 30–60'.

Oct 17 Sun am Biscayne National Park (Advanced) (Barbeque \$7.00)

Sites – The Wall, Anniversary, Rocky Reef, Elkhorn Forest, Cuda Ledge, Ball Buoy, Doc DeMilly. Expect currents, usually we drift dive the deep reefs. Depths 70–110', average visibility 40–80'. Only one commercial dive boat allowed in area. **See advanced criterion this issue.**

Oct 23 Sat. pm Pompano (Advanced)

Drift dive with the currents, perhaps a deep reef or a wreck. Average depth 80', visibility 40–60', good chance of huge turtles. See advanced criterion this issue. **See advanced criterion this issue.**

Oct 31 Sun. pm Tavernier

Sites may include: Conch Reef, Davis Ledge, Hens & Chickens, Little Conch, Capt. Tom's Ledge, 40' Ledge, Fish Trap, Horseshoe. Average depth 30', average visibility 40–60', many moreys, schooling tropicals, unusual pillar corals.

LOXAHATCHEE RIVER CANOE-KAYAK TRIP "PERSEVERENCE CONQUERS ALL THINGS" SATURDAY, 21 AUG 2004

Hurricane Charley interfered with our original scheduled 14 Aug 04 trip to Loxahatchee River. However, we persevered and it came about Saturday 21 August.

Those ADA members who were able to change their personal plans to make the paddle were: Maura Requena, Don Legault, Leonor Ruiz, Juan Carvajal and Pat Hackett.

We showed up at Canoe Outfitters, Jupiter, wearing our ADA shirts at 9:00 a.m. and were in the water with canoes and kayak at 9:45. It started out as an easy paddle, but as we continued there appeared more difficult turns and challenging fallen trees in the river to either go under or around. Juan said we had it easier Saturday than when Leo and he made a previous trip to the Loxahatchee and the river was lower.

Two dams proved to be extra fun because we hesitated to go over the mini "white water", but on encouragement from some boy scouts nearby, made the leap. How proud we were afterwards.

The view and canopy of wild cypress with hanging Spanish moss were breathtaking. Our wildlife on the Loxahatchee on this day consisted of many turtles sunning themselves on downed tree trunks.

After a brief stop along the way for lunch and a few photos, we pressed on to Trapper Nelson Interpretive Site. A Florida State Park Ranger was on hand to brief us on the site and the history of Trapper Nelson. He came to the area around 1936, built a rustic visitors center with a wildlife zoo. He lived his rural existence for 38 years.

Back to the dock and into our canoes and kayak again we were on the River headed towards the end of our journey. The river soon widened and the water turned brackish with mangroves taking over from the cypress. We arrived at the end of our trip at about 3:15, just in time to board the bus back to our departure point and our cars in the parking lot. It was nice leaving our rented canoes and kayak behind.

Divers Dictionary

MASK—Storage container for sea water samples until you reach he surface.

WET SUIT— Exactly what a diver does when the cold water and caffeine kick in.

Cost in U.S. dollars for a two-ounce bottle of Kona Nigari, desalinated seawater from up to 2,000-foot depths off the coast of Hawaii—no doubt the most expensive bottled—water product in the world (do the math: that's \$2144 a gallon). The demand for this and similar, mineral—rich Hawaiian deep seawater extracts, marketed as dietary supplements, is driven by the Japanese, who import some 80,000 bottles a day. (I wonder what the length of the Deco stop is and at what depth)

Not-So-Silent World

Thanks to the ubiquitous iPod, everyone is tethered to an MP3 player these days, but don't try taking that pricey little toy underwater. If you need music, directions, or narration to make your dive complete, H2O Audio is a better choice. The compact iRiver MP3 player is widely available with 64, 128, 256, 512 megabytes of memory for anywhere from two to sixteen hours of audio. Now, what makes it dive—ready is the new H2O Audio DV—X housing with built—in amplifier and underwater headphones that provide studio—quality sound down to 200 feet. Download your favorite tunes via USB cable, lock down the housing and clip the earphones to your mask strap. You'll be jammin' from giant stride to safety stop. *Price:* With the iRiver player, \$449 to \$649, depending on memory size. The H2O Audio also sold separately. (Or for a lot less, Lon will sing for you)

ADA Photography Contest

The only editing allowed is overall color balance and sharpening. Please do not otherwise edit, such as, but not limited to – crop, clone, mend, paint, saturate, cut, paste, move, etc. Of course, this last rule does does not apply to the "Anything Goes" category.

Photographers will provide either 1) prints, and/or slides from film cameras, or 2) jpeg files from digital cameras or the "Anything Goes" category,

Prints or slides will only be returned if a Stamped, Self-addressed envelope is provided,

Prints or slides will be scanned for judging and posting to the website,

Be sure to Include/provide your full name, camera model, category, lighting (name of external strobes, indicate if internal strobe, natural light, etc), special lens, dive site, description of entry, etc – if you do not include this information the pictures will not be judged.

ADA RULES & REGULATIONS

All Members Must be familiar with the following

FOR ALL ADVANCED DIVES (DEPTHS OVER 60') ADA DIVERS MUST:

Be current (dive activity within the previous 3 months).

Have the approval of an ADA Safety Officer.

Have a minimum of 25 logged dives.

Carry an alternate air source (octopus), time keeping device and depth gauge.

Have previous ADA diving experience.

All members must dive with at least a 72 cubic foot tank.

ADA GUIDELINES FOR COMPUTER ASSISTED DIVING

Members using dive computers may extend their time underwater ten–(10) minutes beyond the time allowed by the tables.

Computer assisted dives must be well within the NO DECOMPRESSION LIMITS.

Members should understand and follow the manufacturer's recommendations.

If a computer diver is buddyed with a diver using the tables, both must follow the tables.

If a buddy-team is using unlike computers, both must follow the more conservative computer.

If, in a buddy-team, either computer fails, both divers must terminate the dive.

IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM THE SAFETY OFFICERS' COMMITTEE

All members are reminded to read the "Rules & Guidelines for Diving Activities" you received with your membership package. Number 16 states, "All divers must be present for the pre-dive briefing". If the diver is not present for the entire briefing, diving privileges may be revoked for that dive. Please plan to arrive on time – or better yet – a bit early. We thank you and appreciate your cooperation.

CANCELLATION AND REFUND POLICY FOR LOCAL DIVE TRIPS

Because of our contractual agreements with our service agents – dive shops and boat captains, we must notify them – usually seven days in advance – of the final number of spaces we are paying for. Thus, if our members cancel less than seven days in advance, we regret that *NO REFUND OR CREDIT* can be given, unless trip cancellation insurance has been purchased at the time of the dive trip payment (see next news article!)

ADA TRIP CANCELLATION INSURANCE

The Board of Directors has approved a unique concept in local diving: NO FAULT INSURANCE!!

For an additional \$5.00, per person, per local dive trip, members can eliminate the worry of losing their dive fees because of an unforeseen change of plans.

If, for any reason you are unable to attend a local dive for which you are scheduled and have paid the insurance, ADA will credit your dive fee to another date. The \$5.00 insurance is non-transferable and non-refundable!

When you make a reservation, ask for dive trip cancellation insurance. The Board has elected to continue the insurance offer for this year.

NOTE: It may be discontinued at any time without prior written notice.

Please call Lon with your questions and comments.

IMPORTANT WEATHER INFORMATION

Before departing for the dive site, confirm weather condition with Lon or the designated Safety Officer. It is the responsibility of the member to call; we cannot call you due to the large number of divers involved. For morning dives, call between 6 and 10 p.m. the night before the dive. For afternoon dives, call between 9 and 10 a.m. the morning of the dive.

HOW TO MAKE DIVE RESERVATIONS

Check this newsletter or the annual calendar for upcoming dives.

(Call Lon at (305) 251–4975 to make a reservation. Please do not leave requests on his answering machine, the trip may be full.

We will hold your reservation for four (4) days from the date you call. If we do not receive payment within four days, your space may be given to other members. If you wish to confirm receipt, call Lon.

Ask for details about the trip when you call. Otherwise, details will be given when you call for a weather check. (See "Important Weather Information" this and every issue)

Itemize dates of dives on bottom-left corner of check.

Do not pay for persons other than spouses or other family members. Include their names on check.
