Pickles Reef Coral Restoration Project, ADA by Ken Nedimyer, President July 18th and 19th, 2008 Coral Restoration Foundation

On July 18th, 2008, the Coral Restoration Foundation started the first of six staghorn coral restoration projects for the year at Pickles Reef off Key Largo Florida. The <u>Active Divers Association (ADA) of South Florida</u> booked the whole trip and their club members did all the work under the supervision of CRF team leaders. Eighteen staghorn corals that had been grown in the CRF offshore coral nursery were used for the project.

The project began Friday morning with a two-hour classroom session that went over some of the causes of coral decline in the Florida Keys, what has been done to date and needs to be done to stop the decline and reverse the trend. Local, state, regional, and global threats were discussed and actions that need to be taken at all levels were brought up. The Florida Keys National Marine Sanctuary is the lead organization for addressing many of these issues but citizen participation at all levels is needed to advance the solutions to these complex problems. To this end, the Coral Restoration Foundation is providing both an educational and a hands-on restoration service that is addressing the plight of the staghorn and elkhorn corals, both listed as "Threatened" under the Endangered Species

In the afternoon the group went out for a two-tank dive on the reef on one of the Florida Keys Dive Center's boats. The first dive was a working dive at the coral nursery. The corals to be transplanted to Pickles Reef the next day were cleaned, measured, and marked. Additional nursery corals were cleaned and the mounting blocks brushed. The second dive was at Molasses Reef, one of the most popular dive spots in the world. Here we showed the club members where we had planted corals on the reef in 2007 and an adjacent ship grounding spot where we planted corals in 2003. Both locations are continuing to have 100% survival and outstanding growth rates

The morning classroom session ended with a review of some of Coral Restoration Foundation's past projects followed by a training session for working and collecting data in the coral nursery and the restoration sites.

Day two of the project also began with a two-hour classroom session. The session was divided into three segments:

- Part one was a review of some other coral nursery and restoration programs with a discussion of their strengths and weaknesses,
- Part two was an in-depth discussion of our in-situ nursery program and the restoration strategy we have developed using these nursery-grown corals. This part of the talk also included an orientation to the Pickles restoration site and the dive plans for the day.
- Part three was a brief overview of the <u>REEF fish survey program</u>, the importance of fish on the reef, and the importance of using repeatable monitoring methods.

After a lunch break, all the participants met back at the Florida Keys Dive Center's facility to load their gear on the dive boat and head out to the reef. After a brief stop to pick up the corals from the nursery, we continued on to Pickles Reef for two dives at the restoration site. During the first dive the team transported all the materials to a sandy staging area adjacent to the selected site, learned the site layout and located their specific coral planting areas. For each of the corals growing in the nursery, the genetic "fingerprint" of is recorded. When they are placed on the reef, there is a very specific location selected for each coral. On the second dive, the team separated into three groups to prepare each marked area and mount the specified coral. Additionally, a color-coded, numbered tag is epoxied next to each coral and the colors and numbers are included in a final map of the site. A total of eighteen corals from three different genotypes were mounted at the restoration site, and these corals will be measured, photographed, and monitored in the years to come to evaluate the success of the program and the growth and survival of the corals.

Five more restoration projects are scheduled for the summer and fall of 2008: one in August, two in September, and two in October. Tavernier Drift Dive (Advanced)

Possible sites are Conch Wall, Molasses reef, Victory reef, depths 60-90 feet vis. 50-80 feet. Divers will team up in groups of 4-6, one carries the flag. Let the current carry you, no effort, what a way to go.

Oct. 12 am

BNP (Advanced)

Sites - The Wall, Anniversary, Rocky Reef, Elkhorn Forest, Cuda Ledge, Ball Buoy, Doc DeMilly. Expect currents, usually we drift dive the deep reefs. Depths 70-110', average visibility 40-80'. Only one commercial dive boat allowed in area. **See advanced criterion this issue.**

Oct. 19 pm

N. Key Largo

Sites may include: The Christ of the Abyss, the Elbow, N. Dry Rocks, N. N. Dry Rocks, Grecian Rocks, Carysfort, Shark Reef. Average depth 30', usually no current. Average visibility is 30-50' with many tropical's, morays, cudas.

Oct. 26 pm Sites may include: Conch Reef, Davis Ledge, Hens & Chickens, Little Conch, Capt. Tom's Ledge, 40' Ledge, Fish Trap, Horseshoe. Average depth 30', average visibility 40-60', many morays, schooling tropical's, unusual pillar corals

Diving cost you too Much?

Well let's do something about it. Take the regular ADA Dive costs: trip-\$49.00; gas-\$25.00, tolls-\$10.00, tanks-\$20.00. Total \$104.00. No wonder we do not see families diving anymore. Heck, I'm lucky to be diving myself. But we can do something. Shore diving may be the answer for you. Compare these costs: trip-0; gas \$15.00; tolls-0; tanks-\$20.00; parking \$3.00. Total costs \$38. And the exercise is free.

Some places to go are where the dive boats drop you off, such as the Ero Jacks in Dania Beach and a reef in Pompano.

Some others where boats do not drop you off are: Spanish Anchor in Dania, the Boulders in North Hollywood, Cableland in John Lloyd Park, Yellow Brick Road in Hollywood, The Caves in North Hollywood, Holiday Inn Reef Lauderdale by the Sea, Commercial Blvd. Reef in Lauderdale by the Sea, Glenn's Reef in Dania, The Ledge in Dania and Seventh Street Heaven in Pompano. Don't knock it until you tried it. Some are a good swim and some are close. This time of year is the best to try it for the conditions are usually good. But if they are not good I have yet not to enjoy the beach with a swim or a run.


At all ADA functions we will distribute raffle tickets. Tickets will not be sold, they must be earned.

Keys Travel Delays 15-30 minutes.

Due to a large construction project on US 1, between Homestead and Key Largo, travel times to all sites in the Keys will be longer than usual. Plan to depart home earlier to avoid arriving late. Remember, divers must attend the briefing to be eligible to dive. Arriving late stresses everyone and detracts from your dive experience and enjoyment.

ADA RULES & REGULATIONS

All Members Must be familiar with the following

FOR ALL ADVANCED DIVES (DEPTHS OVER 60') ADA DIVERS MUST:

- 1. Be current (dive activity within the previous 3 months).
- 2. Have the approval of an ADA Safety Officer.
- 3. Have a minimum of 25 logged dives.
- Carry an alternate air source (octopus), time keeping device and depth gauge.
- Have previous ADA diving experience.
- 6. All members must dive with at least a 72 cubic foot tank.

ADA GUIDELINES FOR COMPUTER ASSISTED DIVING

- Members using dive computers may extend their time underwater ten-(10) minutes beyond the time allowed by the tables.
- Computer assisted dives must be well within the NO DECOMPRESSION LIMITS.
- Members should understand and follow the manufacturer's recommendations.
- 4. If a computer diver is buddyed with a diver using the tables, both must follow the tables.
- If a buddy-team is using unlike computers, both must follow the more conservative computer.
- If, in a buddy-team, either computer fails, both divers must terminate the dive.

FOR LOCAL DIVE TRIPS

Because of our contractual agreements with our service agents - dive shops and boat captains, we must notify them - usually seven days in advance - of the final number of spaces we are paying for. Thus, if our members cancel less than seven days in advance, we regret that NO REFUND OR CREDIT can be given, unless trip cancellation insurance has been purchased at the time of the dive trip payment (see next news article!)

ADA TRIP CANCELLATION INSURANCE

The Board of Directors has approved a unique concept in local diving: NO FAULT INSURANCE!!

For an additional \$5.00, per person, per local dive trip, members can eliminate the worry of losing their dive fees because of an unforeseen change of plans.

If, for any reason you are unable to attend a local dive for which you are scheduled and have paid the insurance, ADA will credit your dive fee to another date. The \$5.00 insurance is non-transferable and non-refundable!

When you make a reservation, ask for dive trip cancellation insurance. The Board has elected to continue the insurance offer for this year.

NOTE: It may be discontinued at any time without prior written notice.

IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM THE SAFETY OFFICERS' COMMITTEE

All members are reminded to read the "Rules & Guidelines for Diving Activities" you received with your membership package. Number 16 states, "All divers must be present for the pre-dive briefing". If the diver is not present for the entire briefing, diving privileges may be revoked for that dive. Please plan to arrive on time - or better yet - a bit early. We thank you and appreciate your cooperation.

IMPORTANT WEATHER INFORMATION

Before departing for the dive site, confirm weather condition with Lon or the designated Safety Officer. It is the responsibility of the member to call; we cannot call you due to the large number of divers involved. For morning dives, call between 6 and 10 p.m. the night before the dive. For afternoon dives, call between 9 and 10 a.m. the morning of the dive.

HOW TO MAKE DIVE RESERVATIONS

- 1. Check this newsletter or the annual calendar for upcoming dives.
- Call Lon (305) 251-4975 to make a reservation. Please do not leave a message on the answering machine, The trip may be full.
- 3. We will hold your reservation for four (4) days from the date you call. If we do not receive payment within four days, your space may me given to other members. If you wish to confirm receipt, call Lon.
- 4. Ask for details about the trip when you call. Otherwise, details will be given when you call for a weather report. See important weather information in this and every issue)
- 5. Make your check payable to ACTIVE DIVERS ASSOCIATION. Not to any individual, and mail to :

- 8. REMEMBER! That family members must have completed individual documentation to register as ADA members.
